New book on Bromsgrove's history

The Story of a
Market Town

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The Bromsgrove Society are thrilled to announce the launch of their latest publication "Bromsgrove: The Story of a Market Town" which rolled off the printing presses in April 2022.

Written by well-known local historians and Bromsgrove Society members, Jenny Townshend and Julian Hunt, the book chronicles the history of Bromsgrove over the last one thousand years. Based on extensive original research, the authors present an exhaustive account of the town's development, from a medieval settlement to a prosperous market town and industrial centre whose influence extended across the whole of North Worcestershire.

This major new work will appeal to all those who know and love the town, providing an evocative trip down memory lane. Running to 320 pages, the hard backed book is lavishly illustrated with

drawings, maps and photographs, many of which have not been published before. Its scholarly and detailed treatment will appeal to local and family historians, as well as students of economic and social history.

The opening chapters look at Bromsgrove's geographical setting and its early evolution. Bromsgrove is mentioned in the Domesday Survey of 1086, when it was described as comprising 18 hamlets and the manor belonged to the king. After a charter to hold a market was granted by King John in 1199, Bromsgrove emerged as the principal market town of north Worcestershire.

Around this time the church of St John the Baptist was built, standing on a hill overlooking the town.

Early industries and trades, such as tanners, maltsters, clothiers and linen manufacturers, are all described. Nail-making - the district's best-known trade – was first recorded in the 16th century, and by the 19th century exploitative conditions within the nail trade attracted national attention and strikes ensued. Transport links such as roads, canals, and railways have all played a key role in the town's development. Other chapters deal with aspects such as the Poor Law and workhouses, schools and schoolteachers, health and welfare, housing, and the town's rich religious history.

The book was officially launched at an event held in Bromsgrove on Saturday 9th April. The publication was financed by advanced subscription and subscribers were invited to collect their copies and meet the authors who were on hand to sign the book.

Society Chairman Jo Slade said "The authors, with research assistance from Pat Tansell and typesetting from Mike Sharpe have worked diligently to produce this book. The pandemic stalled the process as access to research materials wasn't available, but the finished book is certainly worth the wait!"

NEW Cultural Compact for Northeast Worcestershire BDC Arts Development

Our inaugural event held at the end of January brought together a great many people from public, private and third sectors. The attendance was by invitation and via press notices which generated considerable interest. There was a particularly wide range of people present. An unfortunate gap was people from the further and higher education sector. Given the overlap of objectives in cultural compacts, and the development of education and skills, this is something to be addressed for future activities. We know that there have already been several bi and trilateral meetings because of the event, and we hope to see some positive impacts and joint working coming forward. The Cultural Compact for Northeast Worcestershire has received funding from Arts Council England.

However, in the short term we need to identify a plan to help harness the palpable energy and enthusiasm. This is particularly timely in view of the Government's publishing of the Levelling up white paper on 2nd February, with one of its 12 missions featuring the importance of developing pride in place. It explicitly references the need to use culture to build on the sense of civic pride, community and potential which already exists in the area, but which can always be developed further.

Furthermore, it has been announced today that Redditch has become one of the 109 Levelling up for Culture Places. This and much more amounts to a great opportunity for us all. To pursue this, we plan to do the following: Meet with the leaders, portfolio holders and relevant officers in both authorities to agree a very clear message about what local government can do to support the work of the compact. This is an important part of the process to ensure that there is no unrealistic expectation of funding, given the financial pressures facing all local authorities. However, it does also allow us to agree what can be offered, which might include: Support with publicity, celebrating those taking a lead in particular fields, highlighting practical support for events, providing facilities to host events such as encouraging volunteering, highlighting the amount of support already given through ours and others work such as reduced business rates for charities and the wider agenda around levelling up funds or the council's wider priorities.

It should also allow us to check that the themes for the compact remain to encourage coherent partnership working to enable: More people participating in more ways, to promote pride in the area Cultural Compact for Northeast Worcestershire, encourage a series of smaller groups to meet, themed around particular interests to explore joint working potential. Themes could be outdoor nature, heritage, participatory arts, health, commercial and business.

Their aim will be to encourage them to share audience/ participation data, support one another in developing activities, and contribute to overall programme of activities set out below. The aim will be to have convened these meetings by April and agree a programme of activities linked to activities and events which are already in the diary to celebrate under the banner of the Compact taking place between June and September.

We're particularly pleased to welcome on board North Worcestershire Economic
Development and Regeneration (NWEDR) who have joined forces with us to promote a
Recovery through Creativity Grant scheme for Bromsgrove. Bromsgrove District Council asked
for expressions of interest from businesses and organisations in the creative industries
sectors to apply for grant funding to deliver activities and projects that will attract residents
and visitors to Bromsgrove Town Centre and Local Centres through the provision of new
experiences.

These include, but were not limited to outdoor public art, art exhibitions, local festivals, arts and crafts markets, food markets, community events, street art, street performances etc. The Cultural Compact for Northeast Worcestershire has worked closely with NWEDR to promote this opportunity and we very much look forward to them being on board and utilising the grant scheme to get the Compact off to a great start.

Housman Birthday Commemorations



Members of the Housman Society and guests celebrated the birthday of poet and writer AE Housman on Friday 25th March. It was the first time in two years the commemoration had taken place in public, due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The author of "A Shropshire Lad" and proud Bromsgrove son was born in the town in 1859. He grew up at Perry Hall and was a pupil at Bromsgrove School. After studying at

Oxford he went on to become Professor of Latin at University College, London, and published his famous collection of poems in 1896. Such

is its success, it has never since been out of print. Housman moved to Cambridge in 1911 and spent the rest of his life there as Kennedy Professor of Latin and a Fellow of Trinity College.

Society members gathered around Housman's statue in Bromsgrove High Street to mark not only his birthday but also the centenary of his second volume of poems



which was titled simply Last Poems. Special guest at the event was Jo Slade, latterly Bailiff of Bromsgrove, who read two of Housman's poems at the statue. Jo's choice of poems was "Loveilest of trees" from A Shropshire Lad which evoked thoughts of Spring and "The Laws of God, the laws of man" from Last Poems which she thought was befitting of the current situation in the world.

After the readings guests walked to Bromsgrove School where a lunch was served in the Old Chapel and Jo was invited to speak about the Housman family and the Court Leet.

Society Chairman, Peter Waine, expressed his pleasure at being back in Bromsgrove after the two-year gap. He said: "I am delighted we can once again celebrate Bromsgrove's most famous son, most grateful to our guest speaker for her informative talk and we are especially pleased to be able to celebrate the centenary year of his second poetry collection with our new publication."

The centenary edition of Last Poems will be launched at the Society's AGM held in Ludlow on Saturday 23rd April. The poems are preceded by a short foreword by Sir Andrew Motion, Poet Laureate 1999-2009, and an introduction by the late Edgar Vincent, author of a biography of Housman. The book includes commentary on the poems by John Cartwright and original artwork.

The two I am most aware of are The Housman Society and WORDS. Valerie was a member of both over a long period. She was a regular attender at meetings and events and a long serving member of the committees.

With WORDS the constitution required committee members to stand down after four years and take a break so her committee membership was intermittent. That didn't stop her being ready to help in the breaks. Valerie was on the committee the year that Michael Cooper tragically and suddenly died. It was about 2001 Michael, was the current chairman. I well remember the dismay of the first committee meeting without him. It was then that Valerie stepped into the breech and took on the chairmanship for the next few years.

We saw it as a tribute and an obligation to Michael to keep WORDS going - and we did. Valerie rose to the occasion.

But Valerie's commitment was not just shown on the committee. What I admire was her readiness to do the lesser jobs as well, even when she was not on the committee: to help serve the drinks, to give out the leaflets, to come to meetings even when the speaker wasn't known to her. Kate Shaw remembers Valerie being very helpful when she was trying to get "Little WORDS" going. Valerie volunteered to go round schools with leaflets and did it thoroughly. And more recently helping with ideas for poems to circulate in Lockdown

Valerie was loyal to, and an asset, to all the organisations to which she belonged. WORDS was one of them. As the vicar said; "And Valerie was there".

Bromsgrove Festival Looks Forward

Events for a Festival in 2021 were slow to materialise due mainly to the uncertainty regarding future pandemic restrictions. The Festival trustees did plan a number of events for the High Street during late June/July but with restrictions still in place, these were postponed until September. Three events had been planned but in the event only two of them took place viz a Buskers Day on the High Street and a day with the Severn Arts Travelling Music Bus in The Bird Box for which costs were incurred including the provision of Public Liability Insurance.

And so on to 2022 when, it is to be hoped, Covid 19 plays little or no part in the staging of the Festival.



Indeed, many of the organisations who have previously contributed to already submitted events

for 2022. One notable loss, of course, is the 10 or 12 events that Artrix contributed to the celebration.

The Directors and Trustees of the Bromsgrove Festival would like to thank all those who contributed to making the 2019 and earlier events a success. The Festival is planned and run entirely by unpaid volunteers and, with the continuing decline in the availability of public funding for the arts, the approach of utilising local participants wherever possible to stage Festival events will continue to be pursued. However, in addition, in 2022 and in subsequent years, The Festival will be taking the findings of the Tell Me What You Want survey into account with a view to involving more residents playing an active role in the arts and pursuing the goal of establishing Bromsgrove as a centre of excellence with regard to resident participation.

The support of Bromsgrove District Council is greatly appreciated and has been demonstrated to be a beneficial investment for the local community. The inclusion in the Festival of nationally-recognised performers does require significant external funding, and potential sources of such funding are being explored. There is every reason to believe that the 2022 Festival can be at least as successful as its predecessors.

Projects from the Friends of St John's

The Cracked Nave Beam



A crack in the oak beam in the nave was noticed last spring and the church's Structural Engineer, Ian Ceney, reported that urgent repairs were necessary to ensure that the beam was secured and that the crack didn't get any worse. Initially the current repair work was carried out from an access platform, but due to

the solid nature of the old oak beam internal scaffolding was required to ensure the safety of the contractors. To secure the new metal

support beams and brackets to the existing ancient beam, the 15inch thick old oak beam had to be drilled. This allowed for steel bolts through the beam to connect the new support beam and brackets together. The ancient oak beam is so solid that many drill bits were broken whilst trying to drill the holes!



Friends were extremely grateful to The Rotary Club of Bromsgrove for the donation of £7,000 towards the repairs and to Bromsgrove District Council's Community Grant Scheme for the grant of £4,950.

The Aisle Pinnacle

The pinnacle on the north-east aisle corner of St John's had become unstable due to exposure to the wind and rain which had caused deterioration in the stone base. The pinnacle was removed and is being re-built off site by a specialist stonemason who will return it to the church when the weather improves. The surrounding stonework will be pinned and repointed at the same time.

Worcestershire's tallest Spire.

The annual inspection of the spire by Dawson Steeplejacks reported that the cracks in the top section continue to get worse. Their ladders have been left in place so that the essential repair work can be carried out as soon as possible. Thankfully the spire was not affected by storm Eunice, but the project to rebuild the failing top section of the spire is now a priority for the Friends of St John's.



Can you help?

The cost of these three projects and further inspections of the spire combined will be in the region of £30,000, and the rebuilding of the spire top is estimated to cost £250,000.

THE MIDLAND SINFONIA

How gratifying to report that, after its Covid-enforced break, The Midland Sinfonia were able to perform once again before an audience which was even larger than that for international guitarist Craig Ogden over two years ago!

High-spirited, almost carnival-like, the "Spring Family Concert" held in St Laurence Church, Alvechurch, on March 12th, certainly lived up to its billing as "a fun-filled afternoon performed by Shulah Oliver and friends". The music included Vivaldi's "Spring" from The Four Seasons and excerpts from Tchaikovsky's "Sleeping Beauty" ballet (complete with narrator and young dancers from Worcester-based Translucent Dance Studio). Popular choral items were also sung with aplomb by the Crown Meadow First School Choir.

TMS, who recently appointed Shulah as Artistic Director - she's well-known in her various roles as solo and chamber violinist, teacher and orchestral leader - are on a mission to widen public appeal for live classical music (the term 'classical' being interpreted in a fairly broad sense). Not only does the larger audience generate more revenue - vital though that is, as we all know; it also enriches the social and cultural life of the community as a whole. (Outreach work locally among schools, care homes and people with dementia, is an interesting development also being developed.)

There are two further concerts scheduled for the current season (7th May and 16th July). Both will follow a similar pattern to the March event, featuring such staple works as "The Lark Ascending" (Vaughan Williams), "Appalachian Spring" (Copland) and "Carnival of the Animals" (Saint-Saens), alongside familiar contemporary pieces and arrangements which will include choirs and other local performers.

However, by no means will the 'traditional' classical concerts familiar to TMS audiences be abandoned. They will continue to hold their place in the annual TMS calendar - as will the annual "Young Musicians' Showcase" (18th June) and also the ever-popular "Quiz and Supper Evening" (8th October).

Renowned composer to lead Bromsgrove Singing workshop

Primary age children from local first and middle schools are being invited to a "singing day" workshop as part of Bromsgrove Festival on Tuesday June 28th at St John's Church.

Alexander L'Estrange is an award-winning British composer, arranger, jazz musician and choral animateur of international acclaim. A Master of Arts graduate of Oxford University, he has been dubbed "the added 9th of choral music" due to his consummate fusion of the English choral tradition with jazz.

L'Estrange is best known for his popular series of 40-minute choral works for SATB choir, unison children and jazz quintet which began with "Zimbe! Come, sing the songs of Africa!" The piece took the choral world by storm, firmly establishing L'Estrange as one of the most popular choral composers of our age; Zimbe!'s 10th anniversary concert, conducted by the composer, took place at New York's Carnegie Hall. Some Bromsgrove children and adults enjoyed performing this during the 2019 Bromsgrove Festival.



The music: Alexander composed a piece 10 years ago for the queen's diamond Jubilee called 'Zadok Rules - Hallelujah!' for an adult choir and children to perform together. It is a witty whistle-stop tribute to kings and queens, royal music through the ages and the works of Handel. Details of the piece can be found here: https://www.alexanderlestrange.com/zadok-rules-hallelujah. A Children's choir bundle will be sent to participating schools if they find they have a bit of time to look at it in advance. This contains a pdf of the children's part, MP3 tracks and a video for children to sing to.

Provisional structure of the day: Start at 9.45am. Alexander will teach and rehearse with the children in the morning. After a packed lunch we will be joined by adult singers (who will have prepared in advance). The day is provisionally planned to end with a performance of the piece (which lasts around 8 minutes) for an audience of parents and conclude by 4pm.

The day is being organised by Bromsgrove Singing Projects, set up in 2019 by Ruth Henley and Steve Cowperthwaite to promote community singing events in Bromsgrove. Any adults interested in taking part should contact Ruth at r.q.henley@btinternet.com.

In harmony, the way we were before


One pandemic, trying to dim our limelight
